This course introduces the New Testament with special reference to background, historical setting, literary composition, theology, and message. It introduces us to the study of various concepts of the New Testament, the historical milieu, purpose, and general content of each New Testament book studied, the relationship between the New and Old Testaments, and the use of the New Testament in ministry.

We look at the life of Jesus to learn from Him as the Master Teacher, Leader, and decipier. We explore Scripture and the lives of other godly men and women to gain a composite picture of leadership that addresses heart issues in the lives of people we will lead.

Foundational principles of effective Bible study are applied for personal and Bible study leadership. Observational skills of the Old Testament are developed through hands-on activities and assignments. Hermeneutical principles are applied to various biblical genres with the goal of equipping the learner to interpret the text based on its historical/cultural and literary context. Application of the meaning of the text for spiritual formation is emphasized as well.
