Students also participate in a Market simulation game that costs each student approximately \$25.

We see that, though the behavior level in other cultures may show some similarities, people from other ethnic groups are extremely different on the more implicit levels of culture: values, beliefs, and worldview assumptions. These values and understandings are deeply held and shape the personal and social identity of a people. We need to understand these people to share the Gospel with them effectively.					
ICS 3300 C	Eastern World Religions	Dr. Tom Stallter	Tues/Friday	8:00-10:20am	RC 151
An overview of the beliefs and values, and how to understand and talk to people about Christ in eastern religions such as Hinduism, Buddhism, Sikhism, Shinto, Taoism, and Confucianism. Native American religion is added to this course because of its connections with Asian culture and religion

A course devoted to learning how to write news stories, feature stories, broadcast stories, and opinion pieces, all using the Associated Press Stylebook. The course stresses information gathering and interviewing, as well as the ability to produce under a publication deadline.

Whether you're revisiting old favorites or encountering a classic for the first time, this is a journey through the world's greatest literature. This course covers famous literature from around the world, excluding American and British literature.

Explore the classics of Russian Literature: Chekov, Tolstoy, Dostoevsky, and more. In this discussion-oriented class, Prof. Benyousky offers an accessible introduction to these influential authors, giving special attention to the impact of Christianity on their works

This honors course is an investigation of modern Britain and its global influence from c. 1485 to the present. Classes will be in a seminar format that encourages discussions of important primary and secondary source materials and relevant themes. Themes to be discussed include the rise of constitutional monarchy, the growth of the common law, the rise and decline of Protestantism, the influence of social reform movements, the growth and consequences of empire, the various cultures within Great Britain, and the Anglo-American influence in the world in the 21st century.
