What are my degree options in humanities?



Humanities majors encompass a broad range of studies. It's important to make sure your desired degree is offered. It's also good to make sure the school provides a number of degree options in case you want to switch majors halfway through your education.

This department is now the largest at Grace and includes diverse majors and minors such as <u>pre-law</u>, <u>museum studies</u>, <u>journalism</u>, <u>English education</u>, and <u>digital</u> communication.



How do you define humanities?

While you research and visit each school, ask the humanities professors what the field of humanities is all about. You might be surprised at what you find from their responses! We also encourage you to ask students about their own definitions of the humanities. You'll get a different answer at every school!

According to Dr. Lauren Rich, chair of the Department of Humanities at Grace College, "To study the humanities is to study what it means to be fully human. The humanities encompass the study of human expression, experience, and flourishing, at both the individual and societal level."








Will humanities help me in the real world?
